

Flemingia strobilifera

Flemingia strobilifera is a flowering plant in the legume family, Fabaceae. It belongs to the sub family Faboideae. *F. strobilifera* is native to Eastern Asia. It is common in China, Taiwan, Bhutan, India, Nepal, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Laos, Myanmar; Thailand, Vietnam, Indonesia, Malaysia, Papua New Guinea and Philippines.^[1]

It is known as makhiyoti (মাখিয়তী) in the north-eastern Indian state of Assam. It is an essential part of the Bihu (গুৱাবৎু) festival, during which the cattle are washed and gently beaten with twigs of this plant.^[2]

- **Flemingia strobilifera** found in Panchkhal valley
- Dry flower which lasts for a long time
