## ARE YOU CONSIDERING BREEDING? The PVDR Ethic

Breeding of donkeys or any other animal is best left to the professionals. Breeding any animal should only be undertaken after careful consideration of these points:

- Why do you want to breed?
- What will you do with the offspring?
- Is there a shortage of the animal/breed that you are considering breeding?
- What happens to the offspring when their new owners no longer want them?
- Is your breeding pair worthy of being bred?
- Do the new owners know what the animal's life expectancy is?
- Are you a competent judge of the particular species of animal?

Many people feel that they can "earn a few bucks" by breeding. The truth is that in most cases, proper veterinary care during and after the pregnancy along with feed costs usually far outweigh any profit.

Many people feel that their children should experience a live birth. The truth is, most animals are born during the night and the birth is missed by everyone in the house. Children would benefit more from learning what happens to these animals when no one wants them.

Babies are so cute. Babies unfortunately grow up into no-so-cute adults. Many donkeys go to horrible auctions and many dogs get killed at the pound.

The majority of animals in our country are "impulse buys". People often see a movie or discover an internet site and then buy an animal. But in our "fast food society", when the animal doesn't work out, we simply discard it. We at PVDR deliberately slow our adoption process to weed out people who are not really serious. We estimate that 65% of all potential adopters loose interest in getting a donkey if they are forced to wait just one week. Can you imagine what would happen to a donkey who is placed in that type of home and will live for 40 or more years?

As a "responsible" breeder, you must ask yourself if you are willing to offer a permanent home to any animal you breed that cannot be sold or can no longer be kept by the person who bought it? Will you offer an open door policy so that all of the animals you breed can be returned to you if necessary?

Furthermore, most animals are not true enough in their confirmation to be bred. Bad genes perpetuate problems within every breed.
